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


way to find out is to try.

Change is difficult, but a necessity for our clubs, events and organization to remain relevant into the future. As an association, everyone needs to accept that there will be some discomfort, not let that deter us from trying, and instead unite in finding ways to solve the problems that arise. As the quote from Charles Kettering says, the only way to progress is to change. Page 63 first paragraph, change to: "EC4WDA sanctions four wheel drive and all approved two wheel drive classes. All competitors must be an EC4WDA member to participate in sanctioned events."

Page 64 omit next to last paragraph starting with: "Sanctioning will begin with the inspection of the first competitor and end when event is completed."

Page 68 Rule #20 clarifies the beginning and ending of sanctioning.

Page 69 Rule #26 change to read: " "While sanctioning is in effect the use of atv's, golf carts, and side by sides will be by the club, for official club use only. Only at the club's discretion may atv's, golf carts, and side by sides be used with a posted sign at registration with rules pertaining to their use. Atv's or side by sides used for towing purposes will be used only for towing purposes. No junior racer vehicles are to be used except during junior racer competition, unless they are used for towing purposes.

LAND USE CHAIR POINTS OUT THE POSSIBILITIES

My name is Gary Marr. Sugar asked me to take over the land use position before she passed away. She felt I would do a good job in the position. I am not convinced. I had been posting things on the website but it does not seem many people use it. I find that unfortunate. I look at numerous websites about the sport of four wheeling. Attendance at EC4WDA Region C MID-AMERICA and the annual EC4WDA meeting is down, so I am not sure how people are getting their information. Add to that the East Coaster is going to only come out twice a year.

During the last annual meeting I was able to attend, I talked about the \$500. grant available thru Tread Lightly! Extreme Terrain is offering a \$350. grant also. Did you know these grants are available? I am close to Youngstown (Ohio) which has a grant center at the public library. I reported on the various libraries in the EC4WDA geographic area at the board meeting that are part of the Grant Foundation Network.

Have you heard about the EPA? In July, 2015, the Environmental Protection Agency introduced a proposal that would have prohibited the conversion of street vehicles into race cars used exclusively for the track. While the EPA has withdrawn the proposal, the agency continues to assert authority under the Clean Air Act to regulate the modification of vehicles used for competition. Congressional action is the only way to guarantee that street vehicles can continue to be modified for the track, well into the future.

The Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports (RPM) Act of 2016 is a bipartisan bill in Congress that will confirm that it has always been Congress' intent that race cars are not included in the Clean Air Act's definition of "motor vehicle." The RPM ACT makes clear that it has always been legal to modify a street vehicle into a race car used exclusively at the track, and confirms that modifying these vehicles for exclusive track use would not be considered tampering.

outdoor car shows, a parade, history displays, Jeep accessory vendors, food, and music. The event will be free to the public and should attract hundreds of Jeep owners throughout the region.

The celebration will honor the workers who created the success, Jeep's role in World War II, what the plant has meant to the growth of Toledo and the standard of living people got from working there.

The day-long festival will kick off with a parade that will transition into a car show. Some streets in Toledo will be closed for the event while other exhibits will be at the SeaGate Convention Centre. There is the possibility of showing old Jeep movies in the Valentine Theatre, downtown. Organizers say they expect 800-1,000 vehicles.

The Jeep brand was born out of a military need for a tough, lightweight vehicle that could quickly get troops and equipment across the battlefield and serve as a mount for everything from guns to stretchers.

Though Willys-Overland didn't draw up the original designs – the Bantam Motor Car Company of Butler, Pennsylvania, takes most of the credit for that – the Toledo automaker did improve it, particularly by adding a torquey engine. Eventually, Willys won the first full-scale production contract in 1941 and would go on to build some 368,000 Willys MBs during World War II. That was the start of a tradition that's 75-years-old and going strong.

Jeeps have been built in Toledo continuously since July of 1941 and millions have been built. Immediately following the war, Willys started making the CJ-series vehicle, which was later replaced by the Wrangler. Over the years, the Toledo factory also built the quirky cab-over Forward Control pickup trucks, the world's first luxury sports utility vehicle in the Grand Wagoneer and three varieties of the Jeep Cherokee.

For a long time, Jeep was the only manufacturer producing a four-wheeldrive vehicle. In fact, they would make anything you wanted in any color you chose. The organizers hope to get as many of the historic Jeeps as they can to attend the event. They've approached some 4X4

clubs, some military vehicle preservation groups and asked them to attend the event in the hope they can display one of





ASSOCIATION NOVEMBER BOARD MEETING OVERVIEW

Meeting called to order by President Barry, followed by board roll call and a review of minutes of the last board meeting.

President's report follows: Thanked the board for their attendance. Talked about some of the hardships some members have felt and experienced over the past year and extended condolences. Talked about association trail ride and thanked Ed McKillup for handling the event as Trail Boss. Wants to clear up any misconception of EC4WDA regarding rumors of "seat time" and how the association is getting blamed for those issues. Discussed that clubs run their events at their own discretion. Wants to clear up any issue on points. Covered the issue with declining revenues for the association treasury as a result of no longer having a Jeep raffle as well as losing a large club. Covered some of his proposals to help combat a dues increase. Proposing to print the directory every two years instead of annually and any changes be sent to each region's membership secretary. Proposing some changes in our Saturday night convention festivities. Proposing some changes in the printing of the East Coaster to be semi-annually.

Vice President: Alluded to the "great team" that produced the Jeep Team Challenge during 2015 Bantam. Offered condolences to those who have suffered a loss in their families and reminded all it is an election year and to consider running for a board position.

Recording Secretary: Nothing.

Treasurer: Discussed our treasury is dropping and encouraged members to find ways for fundraisers. Last year's (2014) convention cost was less than the previous year, but we need to drop that amount even more. Provided copies of the financial report.

Membership Secretary: Talked about the Bantam Jeep Festival and the \$200. check the association received for helping with the event. Membership numbers are dropping.

Region A Chair: Offered condolences. Tucker County had a great season.

Region B Chair: Talked about some issues with his region such as some clubs may not have events in 2017 if the turnout is poor in 2016. AT region meting, plans were introduced to pursue the possibility of having sanctioned events for ATV's, dune buggies, etc. to help draw in more people.

Region C Chair: Talked about trouble getting people to come to meetings to let us know what is going on. Talked about the loss of Tri-County and the addition of a new club, Mudslingers. Has one scheduled sanctioned race for 2016.

East Coaster Editor: Pointed out that if board decides to eliminate East Coaster he would be OK with that. Not much has changed in that clubs do not share their news and community services/events.

Cyberspace Coordinator: Talked about the facebook page and some of the postings there. If anyone has photos please send to him, especially if you have older photos. Would like a facebook convention alert page and would like some feedback on the idea. The "likes" are down a bit from last year.

Trail Boss: Talked about the association trail ride and about the losds of Tri-County.

Rules: Stated he personally didn't attend may races in 2015. However feedback he received was positive. Some issues were brought to his attention, but overall it was a quiet year. Discussed how some clubs are struggling to pay their bills associated with events.

Sanctioning: No major issues other than the usual with dogs in the spectator area and bicycles. Attendance down at races. He will not be seeking reelection for his position unless no one else is nominated.

Community Service: Talked about Bantam and community service in each region. Hopes there will be community chairs for each region.

One Of Our Own Fund: Steve talked about clubs that donated to the fund. Reminder if any requests to let him know.

PPP Program: Decline in participation in the program over the past few years. Thanked the sponsors and members who do participate. Liz will not resume position of the program. Asked if we were doing a winch for the convention this weekend.

By-Laws: Has been quiet. Nothing has been brought to his attention. No pending changes at this time.

Land Use: Barry talked about how he received a call from Gary, that he would not be here tonight. He would be sending his report in the morning. Steve will stand in at the Land Use meeting tomorrow morning.

Events Coordinator: Wendy talked about being behind on some things and numerous correspondence w/hotel sales manager regarding the banquet menu and ticket price. Hoped everyone has a good time this weekend. Feels attendance is down. Pointed out how the hotel has been remodeled, how accommodating and friendly the staff has been. Isn't sure about staying on in this position with trying to juggle Recording Secretary position and feeling like things are sliding and not keeping up with tasks. Thanked Jerry for picking up the awards.

OLD BUSINESS – Jerry talked about the 45th anniversary event. Reviewed financial breakdown of the event and talked about the low turnout. Posed the question as to whether we should ever do this again...maybe?

Cathy talked about Bantam Jeep Heritage Festival. Thanked Mark McCall for his help and about a check the association had received from the festival. Used the money to purchase Solo cups for the event and any remaining cups were sold at EC4WDA events. There are still some available for purchase. Bantam ever brought on a new member to the association. Next year's event is scheduled for June 10-12, 2016.

Barry talked about the loss of Region C's Tri-County. He read a letter he had sent to John Grossen (President) and to date had not received a reply. Terry talked about how fast the decision was made by the club to drop out of the association and how he sent a letter to the club and also received no response. Jerry said the club's new president is Rich Bundy. Barry read the letter he had received from Tri-County announcing their plan to withdraw from EC4WDA.

Cathy asked if we could return to the topic of the anniversary race regarding the trophies. There are 32 first place and 29 second place trophies left over. Barry will have Craig Carr provide a photo of the trophies in case anyone is interested. Barry asked that Jerry include in the next issue of the East Coaster following the convention. Bids should be submitted by the end of February, 2016. Bids will get submitted to Barry. There will be a picture of the trophies in the next issue of the East Coaster as well as on the facebook page.

Liz asked about the issue of the winch for this weekend. Discussion

followed on how to give away this weekend. Possibly everyone in attendance get a free chance to win and also sell additional chances to win it. Liz will handle the PPP and winch tickets for this weekend.

<u>MOTION</u> – "I make a motion to suspend the Point Participation Program until the association is financially stable as determined by the Executive Board." Motion made by Cathy Klotz and seconded by Liz Hummel. MOTION CARRIED.

Next topic of discussion was cost savings. Discussion on reimbursing mileage back down to \$0.15 per mile since the gas prices have gone down. It will help save the association money as well.

MOTION – "I will make a motion to lower the mileage to \$0.15 for the Executive Board members." Motion made by Brad Shoff and seconded by Jerry Schwartz. MOTION CARRIED.

Next topic of the discussion was the convention. Barry is suggesting doing away with the banquet and that everyone goes out on their own to eat and then coming back just for the awards presentations. This will help people save money in decorations, etc., and also help inform the association body we are trying to save money. Discussion on only utilizing just the ballroom for everything - hospitality room & awards presentation since not using courtyard for banquet meal. Cathy suggested we get the beer on our own to help save money as the is a local distributor close by with Sunday hours for the keg return. Carol Rice will handle taking care of getting the beer. Carol asked if we are still putting membership into Blue Ribbon, SEMA, and Tread Lightly? Barry stated we are still paying for Blue Ribbon and Tread Lightly and we do not pay for SEMA. Carol wanted to know since we are trying to save money. Brad asked instead of taking it out of our general fund, but maybe taking it out of the Land Use fund. Steve suggested bringing it up in the Land Use meeting tomorrow morning for some feedback. Carol asked if we truly need to have a spring executive board meeting. Most of the board members agreed that we do need to have the spring meeting. Barry feels we are trimming a lot of expenses that were discussed at this meeting, such as cutting the banquet meal and also printing the membership directories. Terry mentioned that it is in the by-laws that the board is required to meet 2 times a year and if the

spring meeting is eliminated, the by-laws would have to be changed.

Discussion again on cutting back on the printing of the East Coaster. Brad said it would save about \$1,000. per year. Discussion on electronic vs. paper printing of the East Coaster. Discussion on the importance of the East Coaster and how members enjoy having a tangible paper to read. General consensus is we need to continue with the East Coaster, but discussion followed on how frequent it needs to be printed such as in the spring and after the convention. Jerry suggested printing after the convention which would include details of the convention, reports, etc. (November after the convention and in the spring such as April). Discussion of doing a pre-convention mailer to be sent to every member. Discussion on possibly just sending a postcard "save the date" or just a 2 issue East Coaster with a trial of a year. Discussion on doing beginning of May and late November or early December. He will do a folded letter/postcard prior to the convention.

Next topic Bantam 2016. Cathy talked about a wish list for Bantam include a grab bag for kids, handout for adults. Association to help with purchase of drinks and hot dogs, rain poncho with logo on it and signage of who we are and where we are located. Steve suggested that the signage be decided on this weekend as Brady could create when he returns to the graphics communication program at school in January for little cost. Brad mentioned if the association should obtain another credit card to replace the prior one we had for certain expenses. Discussion that we really don't need one as members are reimbursed for out of pocket expenses.

ASSOCIATION CONVENTION SATURDAY 11/14/15 MINUTES THE MORNING SESSION –

Meeting called to order by President Barry. Club roll call by Cathy. We have quorum (22 clubs). No new clubs petitioning for membership. Review of minutes by Wendy. Barry recognized members who are veterans and the body acknowledged with a round of applause.

TOLEDO JEEP FEST; MORE ABOUT IT....

Organizers behind the upcoming Toledo Jeep Fest have booked a full lineup of local bands and have finalized plans for much of the one-day event, but they are still looking for vehicles. "We've just over 350 vehicles registered so far", event co-chair and former Chrysler executive Jerry Huber said, June 22nd. "We have an additional 50 or so that have been identified to be on display in SeaGate Convention Centre. We've got kind of a push going on for registration right now."

The August 13th event in downtown Toledo is meant to be a family-friendly celebration of the Jeep brand's 75th anniversary. In addition to a parade of Jeeps and the all-Jeep car show, there will be live music, children's activities at Imagination Station, historical artifacts, and a pair of beer gardens bookending the event.

Organizers plan on closing registration July 15th. It can be done online at cvent.com/d/lfqf6m. There's a \$15. fee to participate in the car show and parade.

One of the goals the committee set was getting every model year represented – so far they think they have 59 of the 75 years covered – but Mr. Huber stressed the show isn't just for historical Jeeps or custom rock crawlers.

"It's for everybody and it is really a celebration of Jeep, not just specific models", he said.

Officials have been in contact with a number of Jeep clubs around the region and country, and Mr. Huber said there's been a good response. They expect people from a number of surrounding states to attend.

The event will cover much of downtown, stretching from the SeaGate Centre to an outdoor beer garden at United Way's green space at Jackson and Summit Streets.

Inside SeaGate will be a number of specially selected vehicles, including some from Fiat Chrysler's collection of Historic, concept and custom built Jeeps. -ADA, a Georgia-based producer of aftermarket Jeep parts, is expected to

bring sever al Jeeps from its collection. Other key attractions of the Toledo Jeep Fest include:

Local nonprofit Heroes In Action will help to put on a military ceremony to honor veterans and the men and women who built the Jeeps that went overseas during World War II.

Several films about Jeep's history, such as the WGTE-produced "Jeep: Steel Soldier", will be screening inside SeaGate.

ProMedica and Imagination Station are partnering for a kids zone at the science museum.

Three bands will play at Levi Square. Country act Rodney Parker and Liberty Beach is scheduled to play from 11:30AM to 1:30PM; Americana / rockabilly group Kentucky Chrome is scheduled to play from 1:45PM to 3:45PM; and the country / classic rock bank Last Born Sons is scheduled to play from 4-6PM. A fourth group, Josh Boyd and the VIP Band will play from 1-2PM and again, 4-5PM at the Jackson Street Stage.

In the lobby of the Edison Building. an exhibit featuring old photographs, a collection of postwar Jeep toys, Jeeprelated artifacts and other items will be on display.

The hill had a big dip in it for the Susquehannocks event which was proven a little dangerous by Pop Haines when he tried the uphill roll at the grounds first event. Columbia Hill Climbers, May 28-30, 1983

JEERS GREET FINAL JEEP; 1,000 LOSE JOBS AT AMC

TOLEDO, Ohio-Like the old soldiers it carried to war, the venerable Jeep faded away yesterday after four decades of civilian production at the American Motors Corp. plant here.

A red four-wheel drive civilian Jeep, or CJ, was scheduled for assembly Monday afternoon as the last of the descendants of the workhorse that was "strong as a mule and agile as a goat," in the words of World War II correspondent Ernie Pyle.

AMC said at least 1,000 of its 8,600 workers here will be laid off, and workers greeted the final Jeep with loud boos and catcalls, drowning out the few cheers.

"I'm sorry for the young workers. They'll be out looking for jobs because of this," said Duane Betz, 58, of Weston, Ohio, a 38-year veteran of the Toledo plant.

Cheers and jeers

Workers shouted, "Keep the Jeep," and "It was born here," when the last Jeep rolled to the end of the line.

À Jeep with the same tiny wheelbase and familiar grille, called the YJ, will go into production in Canada once machinery and some dies are shipped from Toledo. The YJ will closely resemble the CJ but will have permanent doors and top and car-like niceties such as plush seats and carpeting.

The ride will be softer because the YJ, to be sold under the name of Jeep Wrangler, will have axles borrowed from bigger Jeep products, the Cherokee and Wagoneer family-style vehicles.

Room for new models

AMC can't meet the demand for the profitable Cherokees and Wagoneers, and Toledo now will have room to make more of those and more Jeep pickup trucks.

The first CJs were copies of the military Jeeps, minus wartime hardware such as gun mounts. Over the years, the CJ got softer springs, bigger seats, longer springs and stylish paint jobs. AMC's official view is that the YJ is a natural evolution.

"This vehicle will be much better matched to the needs of the people today than the CJ was," AMC spokesman Steve Harris said of the YJ Wrangler. AMC president Jose Dedeurwaerder said when the CJ's demise was announced in November that "things have to change after 40 years."
